## An Invitation to a Holy Lent

Ash Wednesday (February 21) will usher in the season of Lent, a time in the church calendar set aside for inward reflection, contemplation, and self-examination. While the season is penitential in nature, there is also a certain peace that comes from how we observe Lent. As we recall the many ways that we may have strayed from God and God's will, we can also marvel at how very much we have been forgiven. It is also an opportunity for a new start. People will no doubt decide either to "give something up" during Lent or to take on a new project, task, or ministry.

At Saint John's, we will participate in a Lenten discipline in a variety of ways.

- ✦ The liturgies will reflect the character of the season, and all are invited to attend the Sunday liturgies as well as the special liturgies we will have on Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday.

- ✦ A special Lenten devotional booklet has been prepared specifically for the people of Saint John's Church and will be mailed out shortly. The packet will also contain information about our Phase II Stewardship Drive, which will occur during the Lenten season. Then, beginning Tuesday, February 27, we will have a five week Bible Study focusing on The Gospel of Saint John.

- ✦ Saint John's will have the honor once again to host our guests from the Georgetown Ministry Winter Shelter. During their two-week stay during Lent from March 18, there will be an inter-generational service in the Chapel followed by a shared dinner in Blake Hall where parishioners of all ages can welcome and share food and shelter with our guests.

- ✦ On Tuesday, February 20, may as many of us as possible gather to celebrate Mardi Gras with our traditional Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper. It is a night for celebration of all the gifts we have, especially the gift of this community.

- ✦ The next day, on Ash Wednesday, let us draw closer to one another and to God to begin the observation of the holy Lenten season, so that we can prepare with all our being to understand the great work that God has done for all of us in Jesus Christ – and so that Easter will be as transformational for us as it was for the first Christians.

They were so moved that they started a Spirit-filled movement that transformed the world. That process continues. May we enter even more boldly into it!

## Children's Mite Box Collection



**S**t. John's children raised \$105.36 this fall when they took part during Advent in the church's annual pledge drive. They put their donations into mite boxes which they had taken home at the start of the drive.

The children's collections were given to "Children to Children," an out-reach initiative, which will be used to benefit the children of the Dukathole settlement outside Johannesburg in South Africa.

A fire recently destroyed about 400 shanties in that settlement, leaving more than 1,000 children homeless and in desperate need of food, shelter and clothing.

## Meg's Memorial Plaque      Lenten Bible Study

In the November 2006 edition of *The Sentinel*, it was reported that the vestry had approved the commission of a plaque commemorating the ministry of **The Rev. Margaret Graham**.

The idea of such a plaque, to be placed in the church in the niche between the Resurrection and Ascension windows, was originally proposed by the Graham family and their friends just after Meg's death.

The vestry considered the proposal in early spring, but felt it was too soon to decide how to remember and celebrate Meg's time among us. It was decided to wait six months and to reconsider the issue.

During that period, ideas began to solidify on how this plaque could capture the dynamism and warmth that were central components of Meg's ministry. A concept circulated at the September vestry meeting gained unanimous support:

– The plaque would consist of two of Meg's favorite spiritual hallmarks: a Celtic cross and the first verse of the hymn *"All my Hope on God is Founded."*

– The bottom of the plaque would have a simple sentence recognizing Meg as Saint John's first female rector.

A preliminary estimate for the cost of such a memorial was about \$22,500. A committee for the plaque design and execution was commissioned, to be chaired by **Senior Warden, Margaret Huckaby**, and to include Meg's daughters plus four parishioners. Meg's husband, Bill, would spearhead fund raising efforts, appealing to Graham family members and friends for donations, so as not to compete with the Stewardship Drive already underway at St John's.

The November *Sentinel* article asked for any questions or concerns to be directed to the clergy or vestry. With all the feedback being supportive and enthusiastic, fund raising began in mid-December. To date, approximately \$48,000 has been raised, twice the preliminary estimate of cost. Any excess funds donated will go toward the Junior League's Meg Graham Scholarship Fund.

The Last Sunday after the Epiphany is also the Sunday before the beginning of Lent. It is usually a service full of "Alleluias," since from the beginning of Lent until Easter we are in a season of self-examination and penitence and refrain from the joyous ring of "Alleluia."

## Sunday School for Children

**G**rowing up in a nurturing Christian environment like St. John's is a special opportunity for children. There is the worship service, the chance to gather as a family around the altar during the 9 o'clock service and to serve as an Acolyte. This Lent, we will add music into the mix.

A vital part of Christian growing is Sunday School. Without religious education, it is difficult for children to grow in spirituality and to see how lessons learned from the Bible relate to their own lives. St. John's is blessed to have classes for all ages, 3 through teens. **Christine Deeley-Wood** and a few dedicated teachers ensure that learning is fun and interesting for all.

**Christine Deeley-Wood** and **Vinnie Griski** teach the familiar Bible stories to the youngest group in "*Godly Play*". Although some children walked out when the whale swallowed Jonah, they were reassured that the fish spit him out again, good as new. Learning the Bible stories trains children to better understand the reading of the Liturgy and to relate these stories of faith to their own lives.



**E**very 7 to 12 year old child at St. John's received an invitation to join the first class after Epiphany. Together, they learned about:

- the Three Kings,
- the difference between the Bible story and the legends, – then ate King Cake and decorated crowns.

There was a rousing game of Jeopardy as the next class discussed Christ's miracles and miracles in their own lives.

For the third Sunday after Epiphany, there was a chance to read the Gospel from the Lectern in church and to read Isaiah from a scroll as Christ did. **Ann La Porta** and **Deborah Osborne** lead this class using "*Living the Good News*".

Teens go off for coffee or cocoa and a lively discussion time, as well as social activities beyond Sunday. **Jamie Hoops** ably leads them.

All children are urged to participate in one of the Sunday School sessions. If they are reluctant to come, parents are more than welcome to join them. Come; see what we're all about.

*(Note: Beginning in May, all Sunday education will be held in the Rectory – Children's Sunday School on the second floor; Adult Forum in the living room on the ground floor. Food and beverages will be available in the Rectory kitchen for adults.)*

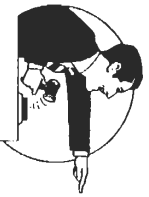

2. **Bidding commences February 26**, so go online to view tempting catalogue items such as a "Progressive Dinner Party", weekends in Dallas, Charlottesville or Rappahannock and tickets to local sporting events.
3. You will be prompted for **credit card information** to secure your bid. No charge will appear unless your bid is the winning bid at the **conclusion of the online auction on March 7**. The St. John's auction website utilizes VeriSign and other security technology to protect your personal information. This information will not be sold or shared with other companies.

**L**et the technology of the auction site work for you! For example, when placing a \$35 bid for "Guitar Lessons," you may also indicate a maximum bid of \$65. Should another member of our community bid higher on "Guitar Lessons," the software will automatically bid for you at the next increment, up to your maximum bid. In the event that you are outbid, it will email to let you know.

Don't forget, the auction, as it has for many years, supports the same worthy causes: the Preschool's Tuition Assistance Fund and the ministries of St John's Parish. Proceeds from the auction will be shared equally.

## Governance of Your Church PAC Night: 24 January 2007

On Sunday, 18 March, Saint John's will once again have its Annual Meeting. On that day, there will be one combined 10am service. At its conclusion, candidates who are standing for vestry positions will give a brief statement about why they feel called to serve as a vestryperson. A first ballot will be taken in the church, and we will then reconvene in Blake Hall after a parish luncheon for our Annual Meeting.

Here are some answers to questions about what the Vestry is and how it works:

– The Vestry is the lay governing body of the parish, chaired at Saint John's by the Rector, Priest-in-Charge, or Senior Warden. The body takes its name from the room in old English churches in which vestments were stored and meetings held.

– The chief lay leaders are the **Senior and Junior Wardens**. They are called "wardens" because in early church days they were primarily responsible for the buildings and grounds of the church. At Saint John's, the vestry nominates the wardens to serve one-year terms.

– **Nine other lay people** serve on the vestry. Each is elected for a three-year term. They are elected in such a way that, each year, three members depart the vestry and three more are elected to begin their three-year terms. A parishioner may serve another term after a one-year hiatus from service.

– Parishioners also serve the vestry as **Secretary, Treasurer, and Assistant Treasurer**. These officers have voice but no vote at the vestry meetings. They have no special term limits.

A healthy vestry will define the vision and mission of the parish in a transparent manner, bringing the views of the parish to the vestry table for discussion.

Vestry officers are asked to undertake quite a bit of work and responsibility in the governance of the parish. Each member serves as either a chair of a **Parish Action Committee** or as a liaison to other vital parochial interests.

At our Annual Meeting on 18 March, the people of this parish will be asked to vote for wardens (**Margaret Huckaby and Michael Flanagan** have agreed to serve another

over fifty parishioners gathered at Saint John's to share a meal, ideas, and work for the ongoing missions of Saint John's Church.

The **Outreach Committee** reviewed the work ahead: Winter Shelter, Outreach grants, and preparation for the House Tour.

The **Property Committee** addressed the issues of an aging boiler, brickwork in need of repair, and church lighting.

**Parish Life** members discussed the Shrove Tuesday Pancake Supper, an Issues Dinner about environmental concerns, and the Maundy Thursday Lamb Feast.

The **Welcoming & Newcomers Committee** engaged in dialogue about training for greeters and ushers and better ways to follow up with those who come to visit our church.

**Stewardship and Planned Giving** rested after a successful fall fund drive before they embark on a Phase II Stewardship Drive during Lent.

**Christian Youth Formation** discussed how to improve Sunday School attendance by our young people. Some very dedicated teachers spend a great deal of time and effort preparing for classes which are not well attended.

The **Adult Christian Formation** meeting had similar concerns. Attendance at Sunday forums has increased significantly, but many adults, especially those with children, do not attend.

As an attempted solution, beginning in May, the Adult Forum will meet in the Rectory Living Room, while all children's Sunday School classes will be held on the Rectory's second floor. Food and beverages will be available in the Rectory Kitchen. All those attending classes, young and old, will be under the same roof, hopefully increasing over all attendance.

## Christmas at the Hospital

*St. John's parishioner Joan Maxwell, M.T.S., is the Palliative Care Chaplain at a local acute-care hospital. One of the ways St. John's supports her ministry is through the provision of consecrated hosts.*

I got to the Hospital about 10:45 on a rainy Christmas morning, loaded down with Bible, worship service, hymns, alb, communion wafers, a cup and a bottle of water and a poinsetta.

The little chapel would hold about 15 people for the service – if everyone sat close together. Cornelia – my fellow chaplain – passed the word to the nursing units. The harpist arrived and reviewed the music.

At noon there were just two people in the chapel, a mother and daughter. As we began, a sweet lady came in a wheelchair with an orderly and a nurse. As the service progressed a family of three came, then a nurse, then someone from the gift shop and then a woman from the ICU. All in all we were 15, packed in like a family.

The liturgy was from materials provided by the Iona Community in Scotland – wonderful language praising the Creation, a delight to hear in the middle of the rainy city. The harpist enjoyed the work so much, she volunteered to play again later.

In the Intensive Care Units (ICUs), I offered communion to those who were awake. Three patients received “spiritually.” When the communicant cannot take anything by mouth, the wafer is touched to the person’s lips and is buried in the earth afterwards. One was a patient whose life support was going to be removed shortly; one was a terrific patient who had been in the ICU for a long time and who was clearly struggling to keep her spirits up; the last was a homeless man who had just been brought in from the streets and was not doing well at all.

At last, I came home and buried the three wafers in our tulip bed. As I knelt on the wet earth to dig the hole, I wept a little along with the rain but was very thankful to have been able to serve in this way on Christmas Day.
