



Location

3240 O Street NW, is at the intersection of O and Potomac, one block west of Wisconsin Avenue.

Directions to the church

From Viginia: From the Key Bridge, make a right onto M Street. Take a left onto 33rd Street; make a right on O Street. Proceed just past Potomac Street and you will be in front of the church.

From DC and Maryland: Travel south on 355 (Wisconsin Avenue). Take a left onto P Street, followed by another left on 34th, followed by a final left onto O Street. Proceed just past Potomac Street and and you will be in front of the church.

Parking

Street parking in Georgetown is free for a two-hour period Monday through Saturday, and free all day Sundays with no hourly limit. There are a number of parking lots within a 2 to 3 block radius of the church.

Contact the parish secretary to check on the availability of limited off-street parking across the street from the church. The entrance to the off-street lot is on P Street at Hyde-Addison Elementary School. If available, the off street lot will be opened one hour prior to your event and close 45 minutes after the event ends.

Accessibility

The church is fully accessible to individuals with special needs. There is a ramp entrance on O Street and an elevator in the church can be located through the Potomac Street entrance.

History

St. John's Episcopal Church, Georgetown Parish, was established in 1796. It was the first Episcopal church in Georgetown, though the port town had been established in 1759, forty-five years earlier. The initial design of the church was contributed by William Thornton, first architect of the



Capitol and a commissioner of the federal district.

Among many illustrious members of St. John's were Francis Scott Key, William Marbury (Marbury vs. Madison), Senators Hugh Scott and Claiborne Pell, Cyrus Vance, Dean Acheson, Ambassador and Mrs. Robert Woods Bliss of Dumbarton Oaks, Ambassador Ellsworth Bunker and his wife Carol Laise, Ambassador to Nepal, Charlie Gibson, and scores of others.



Blake Hall was completely redesigned and renovated in 2005, with a generous gift from a parishioner and matched by a loan from the endowment fund. When the renovation was completed, the hall was named after Blake Parson, the parishioner's late son. Before this extensive renovation, the Parish hall had not been renovated since 1956.
